

When a vehicle is delivered from the dealer it's just only a shell and we send the vehicle to an outfitter to install aftermarket police radios, cameras, radars, cool flashy lights, and a siren.

This vehicle will replace our very old and tired 2013 Ford Taurus Interceptor. Look for the new squad to be on patrol sometime in September.

Crime Prevention

Vehicle thefts and thefts of vehicle contents are common crimes. The Osseo Police Department offers the following suggestions to help you prevent them.

Whenever you drive:

- Always lock vehicle doors and keep windows closed.
- Store briefcases, cell phones, and other expensive items out of sight.
- Park in well-lighted areas.
- Avoid driving at night in high crime or isolated areas.

To keep your vehicle from being stolen:

- Always take your keys, lock your doors, and close the windows when leaving your vehicle.
- Park your vehicle in a locked garage at night, if possible.
- If you park in a driveway, park facing toward the street. Doing so gives thieves less cover if they try to tamper with your car.

93.02 TREE DISEASES.

1) Trees constituting nuisance declared. The following are public nuisances whenever they may be found within the city:

- 1. Any living or standing elm tree or part thereof infected to any degree with the Dutch Elm disease fungus Ceratocystis Ulmi (Buisman) Moreau or which harbors any of the elm bark beetles Scolytus Multistriatus (Eichh.) or Hylungopinus Rufipes (Marsh);
- 2. Any dead elm tree or part thereof, including branches, stumps, firewood or other elm material from which the bark has not been removed and burned or sprayed with an effective elm bark beetle insecticide;
- 3. Any living or standing oak tree or part thereof infected to any degree with the Oak Wilt fungus Ceratocystis fagacearum;
- 4. Any dead oak tree or part thereof which in the opinion of the designated officer constitutes a hazard, including but not limited to logs, branches, stumps, roots, firewood or other oak material which has not been stripped of its bark and burned or sprayed with an effective fungicide;
- (5) Any other shade tree with an epidemic disease.

Traffic Tips

Parents' Role in Developing Safe Teen Drivers

Traffic crashes are the second leading cause of teen deaths in Minnesota teens. Teens are at greatest risk on the road due to inexperience, risk-taking behind the wheel, speeding, and distracted driving. Teens also have the lowest seat belt use rate of all age groups.

Here is a list of things parents can do to keep teens safe on the road, such as:

- Train teens on a variety of road types (urban, rural) and in different conditions (nighttime, rain, snow).
- Provide significant supervised driving experience for your teen—use driving skills checklist.
- Talk with teens to reinforce teen driver laws and set limits (such as passengers, nighttime driving)
- Continue to monitor and train teens during the period of greatest crash risk-the first six to 12 months after licensure.





What's Happening in your neighborhood?

Arrests:
