Canines for Clean Water

With all the joys of having a pet, one of the not-soglamorous parts would be cleaning up after them. Pet waste left uncollected is not only unsightly but unsanitary, with detrimental effects to human health and the environment.

When pet waste is washed into our waterways, it depletes oxygen levels and releases ammonia and excess nutrients, all of which contribute to unsightly weeds and algal blooms while harming fish and other aquatic organism populations. It also contains pathogenic bacteria and other parasites, leading to health issues such as increased levels of Escherichia coli (E. coli), making lakes and rivers unsafe for swimming and recreational activities.

Please remember to take time to properly dispose of your pet's waste and to bring along equipment like doggy bags to clean up when you're on the go. It's up to us to keep our local waters clean.

City Completes Water Meter Replacement Project

This year the City of Osseo replaced every water meter in a large city-wide project to upgrade aging infrastructure. Approximately 900 meters have been replaced by Ferguson Waterworks over the course of the summer and fall. The new water meters are more accurate than the more than 20-yearold meters, resulting in less water loss to the City than in prior years. In turn, this saves the City and its residents and businesses thousands of dollars each year. Utility reads are now more accurate and will account for actual water used by property owners. Thank you to each property owner in the City who helped make this project a success!

Snow Emergency Policy

The purpose of this policy is to provide information to residents about snow emergencies in the City, including procedures for declaring an emergency, notification to residents, and parking prohibitions.

A Declaring a Snow Emergency

The City of Osseo will declare a snow emergency when designated City staff measures two or more inches of accumulated snow at the Public Works parking lot. The Snow Emergency Ordinance can be found in Section 71.06 of the Osseo City Code.

B Notification to Residents of a Snow Emergency

After a snow emergency has been declared, notice will be posted on the following:

- · Email notification list (if you wish to subscribe, please contact City Hall to learn how you can sign up)
- City Twitter and Facebook feeds
- WCCO Television
- · Osseo Gateway Sign
- Telephone recordings: City Hall (763-425-2624); Police Department (763-424-5444); Public Works (763-425-5741)
- Notifications of any future changes to the Snow Emergency Policy will be included in the next available quarterly utility bill mailing

C Prohibited Parking During a Snow Emergency

During a snow emergency, residents can park on the street in all residential areas. However, residents are encouraged to remove their vehicles from the street so that City snowplow crews can plow snow to the curb when possible. After a snow emergency is declared, parking is prohibited in the downtown district for one night between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. This will provide the opportunity for City snowplow crews to haul away snow from the downtown area safely without risk of damaging parked vehicles. The City will make every attempt to declare a snow emergency no later than 8:00 p.m.

D Temporary Parking During a Snow Emergency

The City has coordinated with local businesses and churches to identify temporary parking locations during a snow emergency. Temporary parking during snow emergencies is available at the following locations:

- City Hall parking lot located at 415 Central Avenue
- City-owned parking lot located at 108 1st Avenue NW (behind Heinen's Motorsports)
- Parking lot located at 233 1st Avenue NE (accessible from the alley and 1st Avenue NE)
- Parking lot located at St. Paul's Lutheran Church at 710 Broadway Street East

Residents may park their vehicles at these locations to get them off the street so that City snowplow crews can safely and efficiently plow the streets.

E Violations of Prohibited Parking Rules During a **Snow Emergency**

The City will use a "snowbird" parking rule. If a vehicle is parked on a city street in the residential area and City snowplow crews must plow around the vehicle, the owner has 24 hours to move their vehicle out of the area so that City snowplow crews can come back and clean up that location. Failure to move the vehicle after 24 hours will result in a parking citation and possibly towing. All citation and/or towing costs will be at the owner's expense.





Public Works Perspective

Snow Removal Around Your Home



When clearing snow from your driveway, shovel snow downstream of roadway traffic.

> Make a pocket on the opposite side of your driveway, as shown.

By doing so, snow that is plowed from the street will be pushed into the pocket instead of onto your driveway.

Safety Tips

- Please clear snow from around the hydrants near your residence to allow emergency crews quick access in case of fire.
- Keep public and private sidewalks clear of ice and snow for everyone's safety, including that of school-age children who walk daily to their bus stop.
- Do not stockpile snow at street intersections. This can create a vision obstruction that places everyone at risk.
- Please do not deposit or blow snow or ice onto city streets. Please help neighbors who are unable to clear snow from sidewalks.
- Do not allow children to play in snow stockpiles, as this is a dangerous activity.
- Stay back behind the plow, far from the snowfog. Be smart and don't crowd the plow.
- Stay alert as snowplows turn frequently and often with little warning. They may also travel over centerlines or partially into traffic to further improve road conditions.
- Slow down and drive according to the conditions. Most winter crashes are caused by driving too fast for conditions.

Fire Focus by Fire Chief Mike Phenow

When the weather turns colder, there's nothing better than good home cooking to share with loved ones. Tragically, cooking is the leading cause of home fires and fire injuries. But, with a little knowledge,

cooking fires can be prevented.

Here are some basic precautions to keep you and your family safe when cooking:

- Stay in the kitchen while you are cooking and pay attention to what you're doing. If you have to leave the room, turn the burner off.
- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels, or curtains – away from your stovetop.
- Turn pan handles toward the back of the stove so that they don't get bumped by you or grabbed by children.
- Keep a lid or baking sheet nearby that you can use to cover any pots and pans if a fire starts.
- If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol, don't use the oven or stovetop.



In the event that you do have a cooking fire:

- Turn the oven and burners off.
- Keep the oven door closed or put a lid on any pans on fire.
- · Never use water to try to put out a cooking fire!
- Get everyone out of the house.
- Close the door behind you.
- Call 9-1-1.



Lift Station Improvement Project

One of the largest infrastructure projects that the City has completed happened this fall as Osseo worked to overhaul its three sanitary sewer lift stations. A lift station is an integral part of an effective sewage collection system. Raw sewage makes its journey underground in sloped pipelines that take advantage of gravity to keep costs down. This type of system is commonly referred to as a gravity pipeline. In order for the raw sewage to continue the journey to a wastewater treatment plant, it needs to be efficiently transported to a higher elevation. Pumps and valves raise the sewage to higher elevations where those pipes eventually transport the wastewater out of the City for treatment.

The City sewer system last saw upgrades back in the 1960s. Recently the City assessed the processes, as well as the mechanical and structural components of the lift stations, and determined that major rehabilitation was needed to keep the system working properly and safely. The City received bids for the overhaul project and selected a local contractor who is an expert in this work. The project began earlier this summer and is expected to wrap up by the end of the year.





Clear Hydrants for Faster Fire Suppression

When the snow piles up, be sure to take a couple extra minutes to shovel around the nearest fire hydrant. We recommend shoveling a path from the street to the hydrant and clearing a circle 3 feet in all directions around the hydrant. Finally, remove any snow and ice from the hydrant itself.

This helps ensure that we can both locate and operate the hydrant quickly in the event of an emergency. When a house or business is on fire and lives and property are at stake, every second counts. Fire trucks can only carry enough water to fight a fire for the first couple of minutes. After that, they need to be supplied by water from nearby fire hydrants. Having to spend extra time locating and accessing a hydrant that is buried in snow can take 2 to 3 minutes. That might not sound like much, but it's enough time for most fires to double in size and intensity.

Help keep yourself and your neighbors safer this winter by keeping your hydrants clear and accessible

The 2021 Toys for Tots Drive in Osseo begins on November 16 and will run through December 16. Drop-off sites are in the following Osseo businesses:








Senior Games!

The Skinny on Water Softeners

A lot of us have experience with hard water's unpleasant effects: dingy clothes, deposits on glassware and cooking utensils, scale buildup in pipes and on fixtures, and more. It's not surprising that water softeners are a popular household item.



Soft water has some notable benefits. Among others, it can extend the life and improve the efficiency of water heaters, dishwashers, and other appliances, which potentially saves on water, energy, and detergent use.

A major drawback of salt-based, ion-exchange water softeners is the chloride they produce and discharge into septic or sewage systems. Chloride from salt can seep into and pollute groundwater from on-site septic systems.

Chloride also enters the environment via wastewater treatment facilities. Because facilities aren't designed to remove it, chloride ends up in rivers, lakes, and streams. High levels of chloride in the environment are toxic to fish and aquatic creatures.

Softening Your Options

If you own a water softener or are thinking of getting one, read on for some strategies that can help lessen their environmental impacts.

Determine if you really need one. Hardness is determined by the level of minerals, principally calcium and magnesium, contained in water – the more minerals present, the harder the water. Groundwater is typically harder than river or lake water. The table at the top of the next column provides a common classification of water hardness. You can purchase a hardness-testing kit if you can access water that has not gone through a softener (perhaps from an outdoor tap).

Degree of hardness	Calcium carbonate: Milligrams per liter	Calcium carbonate: Grains per gallon
Soft	0-60	0-3.5
Moderately hard	60-120	3.5-7
Hard	120-180	7-10.5
Very hard	More than 180	More than 10.5

Reduce the salt. Only soften the water that needs it. Don't soften water to outside spigots or to cold drinking water taps. Only soften to the optimal hardness – over-softening wastes salt and water and results in excess chloride. Check your unit's settings and adjust if they're too high – the equipment may have been preset at an unnecessarily high level at the factory.

Do things to reduce your overall water use. It will have environmental and economic benefits, including less need for water softening. Find ideas on how you can conserve water.

Adjust the timer. If you're using less water because of changes in household size or because you've installed water-efficient appliances and fixtures – and your water softener is on a timer – you may be able to extend the time between regeneration cycles. Less regeneration results in less chloride in wastewater.

Upgrade to a high-efficiency water softener. If you're buying or upgrading to a new water softener (a good idea if you own an older unit), look for one that is high salt-efficiency and demandinitiated. Though you may pay a little more upfront, you'll save on salt and generate less chloride.

Go with a service. Another option is to subscribe to an exchange service. The company delivers soft water exchange tanks to the customer on a schedule determined by household size and water hardness level. Removed tanks are regenerated at a special facility, taking the handling of salt and solution discharge out of consumers' hands.
