Osseo Police Received New AEDs

Last month, the Osseo Police Department was awarded five new state-of-theart LIEFEPAK CR2 AEDs courtesy of the Leona M. and Harry B Helmsley Charitable Trust. The 18.8 million dollar grant to the University of Minnesota Medical School aims to provide every law enforcement vehicle in the state with an automated external defibrillator (AED) to improve cardiac arrest survival rates. This generous grant will cover more than 8,300 AEDs throughout the state. The new AEDs are connected using Wi-Fi. These self-monitoring devices can report their status to a centralized online data repository, allowing law enforcement agencies to know whether their devices are ready or need maintenance. The information collected will also allow the Center for Resuscitation Medicine to improve its response to cardiac arrests and demonstrate how swift law enforcement response gives patients a better chance of survival. Osseo Officers will soon be trained on the new AEDs and deployed in each squad.

During the summer months, burglars go through neighborhoods looking for uncut lawns and stuffed mailboxes. In the evening, they look for darkened houses or lights that have been left on too long. The following burglary prevention tips will help to make you and your family safe while also showing you how to become a part of the OPD Team, so that we may serve and protect Osseo, together.

The Burglary Basics

- Make your home look occupied, and make it difficult to break in.
- Lock all outside doors and windows before you leave the house or go to bed. Even if it is for a short time, lock your doors!
- Leave lights on when you go out. If you are going to be away for a length of time, connect some lamps to automatic timers to turn them on in the evening and off during the day.

Don't tempt a thief:

- Lawn mowers, weed eaters, barbecue grills, and bicycles are best stored out of sight.
- Always lock your garden sheds and garages.
- Use curtains on garage and basement windows.
- Never leave notes on your door such as "Gone shopping."

Locks...get the best:

- No lock, regardless of its quality, can be truly effective. Key-in dead bolt locks provide minimum security. Ask a locksmith for advice on your situation.
- Change locks immediately if your keys are lost or stolen.
- When moving into a new home, have all locks changed.

Targeting the outside:

- Have adequate exterior lighting. A motion-sensitive light is recommended for backyards.
- Trim trees and shrubs so that they cannot be used as hiding places for intruders.
- Make sure your door hinges are on the inside.

Alarms:

• An alarm system is excellent for home security. It provides peace of mind to homeowners, especially while on vacation. There is a wide variety of alarm systems on the market.

Other precautions you should take:

- Never leave keys under doormats, flowerpots, mailboxes or other "secret" hiding places—burglars know where to look for hidden keys.
- Keep a detailed inventory of your valuable possessions, including a description of the items, date of purchase and original value, and serial numbers, and keep a copy in a safe place away from the home—this is a good precaution in case of fires or other disasters. inventory.
- Be a good neighbor. If you notice anything suspicious in your neighborhood, call 911.
